

# Prepositions of Time: Deadlines and Duration

INTERMEDIATE

**Focus:** Not later than, Specific time points, Expiry dates, Situations continuing, Till vs Until, End points of actions, Action vs State, Fixed deadlines vs Duration, Future time markers, Future meaning

## 1. BY (Deadlines and Points in Time)

We use **by** to talk about a **deadline** or a specific end point. It means "not later than" or "at or before" a specific time.

- **Meaning:** The action happens *at* that moment or *before* it.
- **Key Concept:** The action is complete at the time mentioned.
- **Structure:** By + Time / Date

### Examples:

- I must finish this report **by** 5:00 PM. (I can finish at 3:00 or 4:55, but not later than 5:00).
- **By** next year, we will have a new house.

## 2. UNTIL / TILL (Duration and Continuing Situations)

We use **until** (or the informal **till**) to talk about a situation that continues **up to** a certain moment and then stops.

- **Meaning:** How long an action continues.
- **Key Concept:** Use this for continuous states (sleeping, waiting, working, staying) rather than momentary actions (arriving, finishing).
- **Structure:** Until + Time / Date

### Examples:

- We waited **until** midnight. (The waiting continued up to midnight, then stopped).
- I am staying in London **until** Friday.

### KEY DIFFERENCE: Action vs. State

- **Use BY** for actions that happen quickly or finish at a point (finish, leave, arrive, submit).
  - *Correct:* "Send it **by** Monday."
- **Use UNTIL** for states that continue over time (wait, stay, sleep, be).
  - *Correct:* "Stay here **until** Monday."

## 3. BY THE TIME (Conjunction)

We use **by the time** to connect two clauses. It sets a time limit for the main action. The tense we use depends on whether we are talking about the past or the future.

### A. Future Meaning

When referring to the future, we use the **Present Simple** after *by the time*. The main clause usually uses the *Future Perfect* or *Future Simple*.

- **Structure:** By the time + Subject + Present Simple, ...
- **Example:** By the time he **arrives**, we will have eaten dinner.

### B. Past Meaning

When referring to the past, we use the **Past Simple** after *by the time*. The main clause usually uses the *Past Perfect*.

- **Structure:** By the time + Subject + Past Simple, ...
- **Example:** By the time the police **arrived**, the thief had escaped.
