The Global Network

In the modern world, products are rarely made in one single place. Instead, they are created through a complex system called the supply chain. For a smartphone, the process begins in mines where raw materials, like lithium and gold, are extracted. These materials are shipped to factories across the globe. In these factories, parts are manufactured and then assembled into a finished product. This stage requires careful coordination to ensure all components arrive at the same time.

Moving the Goods

Once the phones are boxed and ready, the logistics phase begins. Large quantities of products are moved to massive warehouses. These buildings are the "brains" of the operation. Here, inventory is tracked using digital systems. When you click "buy" on a website, a signal is sent to the warehouse. The item is picked, packed, and labeled by workers or robots. It is then loaded onto a truck or a plane for the next part of its journey.

The Last Mile

The final and most expensive part of the supply chain is called "the last mile." This is the movement of the product from a local distribution center to your home. Logistics companies use sophisticated software to find the fastest routes for delivery drivers. Because customers expect fast shipping, companies must keep their supply chains efficient. If one part of the chain is delayed, the whole system is affected, showing how connected our global economy has become.

INSTRUCTIONAL PROCEDURE

- 1. Pre-reading (10 mins):** Display the image prompt. Ask students to guess how many countries are involved in making a simple t-shirt or phone. Write their guesses on the board.
- 2. Reading & Chunked Tasks (20 mins):**
 - **First Read:** Have students read the text individually to get the general idea.
 - **Focus on Form:** Ask students to underline examples of the passive voice (e.g., "are shipped," "is tracked"). Discuss why we use the passive voice here (the action is more important than the specific person doing it).
- 3. Post-Reading & QAR Discussion (15 mins):**
 - Break students into small groups to answer the QAR questions.
 - For the "Author and You" question, facilitate a whole-class discussion about the "hidden" workers in the supply chain (delivery drivers, warehouse staff) to build empathy and social awareness.
